Thank you for praying for all our past and future activities and we pray that God may be honoured and glorified in all that we do.




School NEWS

About 300 people marched across the Shoalhaven Bridge to the Bomaderry Children's Home. The day marked 20 years since the Bringing Them Home report was handed down, which detailed the trauma caused by the forced removal of Indigenous children because of the colour of their skin.

Those children became known as the Stolen Generations. The students heard both humorous and sad stories from members of the Stolen Generations who lived at the Bomaderry homes as children.

We looked at historic photos and toured the memorial garden where purple poppies were laid in remembrance. We also enjoyed some Aboriginal music and dancing, food and story-telling.

"I learnt more about our history and the heritage of Aboriginal people. I learnt it was good for elders to pass



stories on to the younger generation so we can know about the tragic events that happened."

"Walking across the bridge was significant because we all marched together."

"I liked watching the Cullunghutti preschool students dancing the spirit dance and black cockatoo dance."

After the big day, we went back to our accommodation. We munched our way through dinner and then drove to Questacon. I think everyone had fun in the first room. Flying off to State Finals by Mr Clarke

In May, eight of our Year 8 Technology students travelled to Ulladulla High School to take part in the Aeronautical Velocity Challenge (AVC) Regional Final. Teams from Bowral to Merimbula competed against each other to build their planes and rockets in the time period.

The planes team of Lincoln Davie, Micah Perry, Nathan Spinks and Harrison Thomas managed to produce a very fast plane, which came second by 0.02 of a second, and a height plane that won their round. Unfortunately, they had trouble in the dog fights and didn't place.

The rocket team of Isabelle McPhail, Hailey Frew, Mia Hunter and Courtney Nielsen faced some very difficult conditions, with rain and a strong headwind but still managed a respectable distance of 69.5m, which placed them 3rd by only 2 meters.

Both teams received wild card entries into the State Final which was held at the University of Wollongong in June.

Unfortunately the rocket team struggled at the final with technical



difficulties, which saw their rocket fail to launch in the first round.

The quality of the competition was extremely high, which produced some exceptional results in both planes and rockets.
